IV. Prerequisite(s): Basic knowledge of the Spanish language in the following areas: speaking, listening, reading, and writing. The successful online student must be able to log on at least three times a week to complete activities, in addition to off line reading and studying

V. Student Learning Outcomes/Course Objectives:

By the end of the semester, students who have successfully completed all activities and requirements will be able to perform the following tasks in Spanish:

1. Comprehend words, phrases and sentences in standard written and spoken Spanish.
2. Write short simple sentences and paragraphs using learned vocabulary and grammatical structures to express feelings and ideas.
3. Communicate with their Spanish -speaking patients using basic vocabulary and phrases required for practical health care situations and discuss questions about symptoms.

4. Develop communicative survival, using key vocabulary essential to each context to enable them to utilize their Spanish in the real world at work.
5. The ability to interact with his/her patients in the Spanish language,
6. Transfer directly his/her daily “need-to-know” activities in his/her daily job environment.
7. Reproduce the target language in an emergency situation in order to assess the scene, and collect the client’s personal information and medical history.
8. Recognize specific cultural markers that distinguish Spanish speakers from non-Spanish speakers regarding how they deal with emergencies, illness, and medical care.
9. Speak using words, phrases and sentences to ask/give information in Spanish.

VI. Attendance: This is a Web course and the student is expected to log in to Blackboard and MySpanishlab website to work on the assignments at least three times a week; this is mandatory for the successful completion of this course.
