COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Social psychology is the scientific study of the way people think about, feel, and behave in social situations. It involves understanding behavior as the individual interacts with others in the social environment.

COURSE GOALS:

The primary goal of this course is to introduce you to the theories, research methods, and findings of social psychology. An equally important goal, is to help you understand yourself and your behavior as you interact with others in the social environment. You should be able to apply the lessons of social psychology in your everyday

life. Social psychology is <u>always</u> operating in the real world.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

QUIZZES--There will be 12 quizzes to take throughout the semester and they are worth 10 points a piece. All quizzes will be multiple choice and each question will be worth 1 point a piece. Here's how you take your quizzes...

1. Click "Course Documents" in the tool bar on

the left.

- 2. Take your quiz and send me the results through email. Simply number 1-10 and answer with the correct corresponding letter. In the "subject" of the email, identify the quiz results you are sending and your course. For example, Chap 1 quiz, Soc Psyc. If you do not properly identify the work you are sending, you will receive a zero. I highly suggest you save a copy of your email. Credit will not be issued without this documentation.
- 3. I will then post your quiz grade in the gradebook.

PARTICIPATION--This grade will come from your discussion topics. There will be 6 of these throughout the semester and they are worth 20 points a piece. You must answer each assigned topic (with a 3-5 sentence answer). In addition, you must respond (with a 3-5 sentence answer) each time to one other student's answer to the same topic. These discussions are informal and are your opinions. You will receive 10 points for your answer and 10 points for your response to someone else's answer. To participate in the discussion topics, you need to...

- 1. Click "Discussion Board" in the tool bar on the left.
- 2. Click on the underlined discussion topic. I will post the discussion topic for the appropriate week.
- 3. Click "Add New Thread".
- 4. Fill in forum (discussion) topic in the "Subject" box.
- 5. Answer/respond to the discussion topic.
- 6. Click "Submit".
- 7. Click "OK".

To respond to someone else's answer...

- 1. Click "Discussion Board" in the tool bar on the left.
- 2. Click on the underlined discussion topic.
- 3. Select the student you want to respond to.
- 4. Click "Reply".
- 5. Respond

- 6. Click "Submit".
- 7. Click "OK".

ASSIGNMENTS--There will be 6 assignments to complete throughout the semester and they are worth 20 points a piece. They must be typed, double-spaced, 12 pitch and ½ page. These are mini assignments, please do not get lengthy with these. You will send your assignments to me through email. In the "subject" of the email, identify the assignment you are sending and your course. For example, Chap 3 Assign, Soc Psyc. If you do not properly identify the work you are sending, you will receive a zero. I highly suggest you save a copy of your email. Credit will not be issued without this documentation. The coursework will then be graded and posted to the gradebook.

FINAL PROJECT--This project will be considered your "final". It is worth 120 points. I will not accept this project until the week it is due on the calendar. You will send your final project through email also. Here's what you need to do for the project...

- 1. Watch a movie of your choice...rent, theater, etc.
- 2. Identify 5 social psychology concepts in the movie. The concepts you identify must come from the glossary (pages 459-468) in the back of your

assigned textbook.

- 3. Write a paper covering these concepts, constructing 5 different paragraphs. Briefly describe in 5-7 sentence paragraphs, the scene and explain how it relates to a particular social psychological concept. For EACH concept, you must- identify the concept in your paragraphs by either **bolding**, BY PUTTING IT IN ALL CAPS, or <u>underlining</u>
- 4. The paper must be typed, double-spaced, 12 pitch, and 1-1 $\frac{1}{2}$ pages in length. No particular style is required, but proper grammar, punctuation, and spelling are expected on your paper.
- 5. Include a title page with the following:
