# Odessa College HIST 1301: American History to 1877 Spring 2011

**Textbook:** Brinkley, *The Unfinished Nation*, vol. 1, 6<sup>th</sup> ed.

## I. Purpose

The purpose of this course is to provide you with an understanding of the events, people and ideas that have shaped our national history beginning with Native Americans on this continent and the European settlers and the forces there. We will consider the changing nature of everyday life, as well as the political and economic currents that have shaped national policy. This course will include discussions of the American War of Independence, Westward Expansion, and the Civil War.

### II. Attendance

I do take attendance which will assist me in determining grades at the end of the semester, particularly if you are "on the bubble" between grades. You are paying to be in this class and have made a commitment to be a part of it by registering for the class, and therefore, you should be here. Attendance and participation in class, both through discussion and through note-taking, are essential if you wish to succeed. There will be material discussed in class that is not part of the textbook. Attendance can be both a bane and a blessing to your grade – It is your choice. The course policies regarding attendance are as follows.

- 1. If you must leave class early, please let me know beforehand.
- 2. If you miss more than two classes, your final grade will be reduced by three points per absence.
- 3. Students who habitually sleep in class will be counted absent.
- 4. Do not be late to my class. If you are late for reasons that do not involve accidents or work, wait until the break and then join class.

**Note:** Packing up early annoys me, and doing so ensures that whatever I am saying will be on the test.

## III. Make Ups

Make-up exams will be administered only for excused absences, and at a time convenient for the departmental staff.

Make-up exams consist of significantly more writing than "normal" exams. I would encourage each student to attempt to make every effort to not "skip" or miss exams.

## IV. Conduct

- 1. You will treat one another with respect. Minimally, this means that you should tolerate what others may have to say about a particular topic, even when you may disagree.
- 2. ALL STUDENTS are to come to class prepared. I come to class prepared and intend to provide a lively and engaging atmosphere for you to pursue your intellectual interests. You must do the same.
- 3. This is a history class. This means that homework for other classes or extraneous reading should be done at another time. I will warn you once and then ask you to leave my class.
- 4. Side conversations in class will not be tolerated. I offer ample time for class discussion, and comments and questions are always welcome. Side conversations distract others and inhibit the learning process.
- 5. Cell phones are to be turned completely off during my class. There is to be no text messaging, ringing phones, or answering of those phones. If you have a pending emergency situation, notify me before class starts.
  - 6. Men may not wear head coverings in my class.
- 7. Plagiarism, cheating on a test, and unauthorized collaboration with another student on an assignment will result in a zero for the assignment and an "F" in the course.
